<u>All jewelry is made in England</u> – just outside of London in a town called Stoke on Kent.

<u>Watches</u> – same as above - Movement is made in Japan – links easily removable to adjust size.

<u>Scarves & shawls</u>- 100% Italian silk – hand finished – hand hemmed in Italy. Very comparable to Hermes quality.
